

The Powerful Knowledge we will take away from this Learning Enquiry (what we will be learning):

This learning enquiry will introduce the children to the art of sculpture. They will use Art and Design as a vehicle to express ideas, experiences and imagination creatively.

They will begin to appreciate the work of others and understand where their ideas are derived from. They will learn about great artists and begin to understand their art forms.



Children will learn to evaluate and analyse the creative work of others, describing the similarities and differences between different disciplines and practices and make links to their own work.

Children will develop a wide range of art techniques. They will use simple shapes to make sculptures of the human form, explore and make sculptures with inside and outside spaces and work collaboratively to create large chandeliers based on Dale Chihuly's work.

sculpture	A 3D form created to represent a thing
Clay	Natural material used for modelling
Mould	Verb – to form a shape out of a malleable substance such as clay

Texture	How it feels when touched
Material	What something is made of – wood, metal, paper
Medium	The material that has been used to create the art
