British Values Democracy

In History, when teaching the Romans, the children learn about the Republic of Rome.

In Geography, the children voice the opinions and come to a majority decision when deciding which European city to create a digital advert of.

In reading, when studying the Demon Headmaster, the children develop an understanding of how the children in the story to are not given their own voice, which results in the democracy imploding.

In reading, while studying 'The Demon Headmaster', the children learn how debate works by justifying which character they empathise with.

British Values Rule of Law

In History, when teaching the Romans, the children learn about how the Celts were advised to abide by Roman laws or face their democracy being overruled.

In computing, when teaching programming, the children learn the algorithms have to follow a specific code to produce the outcome in order for it to work.

In e-safety, the children learn that the rules and policies set in place when online are there to keep them and others safe.

In P.E, particularly when learning about an invasion game, the children develop an understanding of the laws and penalties of the game and why they are put in place.

British Values Individual Liberty

In Design and Technology, when making moving storybooks the children are encouraged and taught to manage risks and be unique with their designs.

During the residential experience, the children are encouraged to test themselves by taking on challenges that can make them feel uncomfortable as they are new but are still in a safe environment.

In Writing, when studying about Daphne and the Doughnuts, the children develop their understanding of how to exercise their freedoms while recognising the consequences of their actions.

In Relationships Education, children learn how to exercise their rights and freedoms within the context of feeling safe and understanding that their choices have consequences.

British Values Mutual Respect

In music, through the origin of blues music, mutual respect is linked through the teaching of slavery.

In Art, children develop an appreciation for different styles and techniques within painting and learn that every artist has to right to produce the image that speaks to them.

In writing, when studying the 'Paper Bag Prince', the children reflect upon how the environment deserves mutual respect as well as the Paper Bag Prince.

In reading, when studying 'The Great Chocoplot', the children become aware of the differences and potential struggles face due to their home circumstances and how everyone should be given equal opportunities.

British Values Tolerance

In Design and Technology, when making moving story books the children are taught to compromise and be tolerant of their peers' opinions.

In Geography, the children develop their understanding of tolerance through learning about the culture of different European cities.

In writing, when studying 'The Most Wonderful Thing in World', the children learn that your status or background should not negatively impact our life choices and opportunities.

When learning about living the wider world the children are taught about prejudices cause discrimination, specially referring to genders and ethnicities.
